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## AUDIT OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the audit were to consider the college's internal control over financial reporting; to determine compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants; to determine the fairness of the presentation of the financial statements; and to recommend appropriate actions to correct any deficiencies.

## COMPLIANCE FINDING

### **Failure to Report Pell Disbursements on a Timely Basis**

Pell disbursements were not always reported to the U.S. Department of Education within 30 days, as required by federal regulations. Disbursements were reported from 13 to 45 days late (page 6).

## OPINION ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The opinion on the financial statements is unqualified.

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**INTRODUCTION**

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**POST-AUDIT AUTHORITY**

This is a report on the financial and compliance audit of the Tennessee Board of Regents, Pellissippi State Technical Community College. The audit was conducted pursuant to Section 4-3-304, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, which authorizes the Department of Audit to “perform currently a post-audit of all accounts and other financial records of the state government, and of any department, institution, office, or agency thereof in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and in accordance with such procedures as may be established by the comptroller.”

Section 8-4-109, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, authorizes the Comptroller of the Treasury to audit any books and records of any governmental entity that handles public funds when the Comptroller considers an audit to be necessary or appropriate.

**BACKGROUND**

Pellissippi State Technical Community College began operation as State Technical Institute at Knoxville. The institute was established by the General Assembly in 1963. In 1988, the General Assembly combined the campuses of State Technical Institute at Knoxville and the Oak Ridge branch of Roane State Community College in Knoxville to form Pellissippi State Technical Community College.

The college awards the Associate of Applied Science, the Associate of Arts, and the Associate of Science degrees and certain certificates.

**ORGANIZATION**

The governance of Pellissippi State Technical Community College is vested in the Tennessee Board of Regents. The Governor, the Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Director of the Tennessee Higher Education Commission serve *ex officio* on this board. The chief administrative officer of the college is the president, who is assisted and advised by members of the faculty and administrative staff.

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## **AUDIT SCOPE**

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The audit was limited to the period July 1, 1999, through June 30, 2001, and was conducted in accordance with government auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Financial statements are presented for the years ended June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000. Pellissippi State Technical Community College is an institution of the Tennessee Board of Regents, which is an integral part of state government. As such, the Tennessee Board of Regents has been included as a component unit in the *Tennessee Comprehensive Annual Financial Report*.

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## **OBJECTIVES OF THE AUDIT**

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The objectives of the audit were

1. to consider the college's internal control over financial reporting to determine auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements;
  2. to determine compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants;
  3. to determine the fairness of the presentation of the financial statements; and
  4. to recommend appropriate actions to correct any deficiencies.
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## **PRIOR AUDIT FINDING**

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Section 8-4-109, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, requires that each state department, agency, or institution report to the Comptroller of the Treasury the action taken to implement the recommendations in the prior audit report. The college filed its report with the Department of Audit on November 20, 2000. A follow-up of a prior audit finding was conducted as part of the current audit.

## RESOLVED AUDIT FINDING

The current audit disclosed that the college has corrected a previous audit finding concerning the failure to perform refund calculations for all students who unofficially withdraw.

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## RESULTS OF THE AUDIT

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### AUDIT CONCLUSIONS

#### Internal Control

As part of the audit of the college's financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000, we considered internal control over financial reporting to determine auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements, as required by government auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Consideration of internal control over financial reporting disclosed no material weaknesses.

#### Compliance

The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*. An immaterial instance of noncompliance, along with the recommendation and management's response, is included in the finding and recommendation.

#### Fairness of Financial Statement Presentation

The Division of State Audit has rendered an unqualified opinion on the college's financial statements.

Dear Mr. Morgan:

We have audited the financial statements of Pellissippi State Technical Community College, an institution of the Tennessee Board of Regents, which is a component unit of the State of Tennessee, as of and for the years ended June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000, and have issued our report thereon dated March 28, 2002. We conducted our audit in accordance with government auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. As discussed in Note 10 to the financial statements, the college changed the threshold for capitalizing equipment. Also, as discussed in Note 14 to the financial statements, the college implemented GASB 33, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Transactions*.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the college's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of the college's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We did, however, note one immaterial instance of noncompliance that we have included in the Finding and Recommendation section of this report. We also noted certain other less significant instances of noncompliance, which we have reported to the college's management in a separate letter.

#### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the college's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control over financial reporting, which we have reported to the college's management in a separate letter.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee and management and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties. However, this report is a matter of public record.

## **FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION**

### **Failure to report Pell disbursements on a timely basis**

#### **Finding**

Pell disbursements were not reported to the U.S. Department of Education (ED) within the time period required by federal regulations. The 2000-2001 *Student Financial Aid Handbook*, volume 3, page 80, specifies the reporting deadline as follows:

A school must submit a disbursement record within 30 days of the date the school becomes aware of a Pell change (for example, a new recipient, or an increased award). Schools may do this by reporting once every 30 calendar days (or more frequently), or may set up their own systems to ensure that changes are reported in a timely manner.

If a school doesn't report any data for a period of 30 or more calendar days, the Department will consider that the school had no data to report for that period, and any actions (such as changes in authorization levels) will be based only on the data reported up to that time.

For 11 of 13 students tested for the year ended June 30, 2000, (84.6%) the college did not submit disbursement records to ED within 30 days of Pell disbursements to students. In addition, for six of nine students tested for the year ended June 30, 2001, (66.7%) the college did not submit disbursement records to ED within 30 days of Pell disbursements to students. Disbursements were reported from 13 to 45 days late. According to financial aid personnel, because of their other responsibilities, they were not always able to meet this reporting requirement.

#### **Recommendation**

Financial aid personnel should submit Pell disbursement records within the time period specified by federal regulations.

#### **Management's Comment**

We concur with the audit finding and recommendation. Effective immediately, the Financial Aid Office will report the Pell disbursement records at least once monthly as specified by federal regulations. Departmental procedures have been updated to include the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month as this reporting date.

We have audited the accompanying balance sheets of Pellissippi State Technical Community College, an institution of the Tennessee Board of Regents, which is a component unit of the State of Tennessee, as of June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000, and the related statements of changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the years then ended. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Tennessee Board of Regents, Pellissippi State Technical Community College, as of June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000, and the changes in fund balances and the current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

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**NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**Reporting Entity**

The college is a part of the State University and Community College System of Tennessee (Tennessee Board of Regents). This system is a component unit of the State of Tennessee because the state appoints a majority of the system's governing body and provides financial support; the system is discretely presented in the *Tennessee Comprehensive Annual Financial Report*.

**Basis of Presentation**

The financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). The college uses the AICPA College Guide model for accounting and financial reporting.

**Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis, except that depreciation on plant assets is not recorded and revenues and expenditures of an academic term encompassing more than one fiscal year are reported solely in the fiscal year in which the term is predominantly conducted. All restricted resources are recorded as additions to the fund balances of the appropriate fund groups. Restricted current resources are then recorded as revenues during the period in which they are expended or all eligibility requirements have been met. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period, as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the funds are accounted for as (1) expenditures, for normal replacement of movable equipment and library holdings; (2) mandatory transfers, for required debt amortization and interest; and (3) nonmandatory transfers, for all other cases.

**Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available, the college maintains accounts in accordance with the principles of fund

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accounting. With this procedure, resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds for specified activities or objectives. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds with similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds which are allocated to specific purposes by the governing board. Externally restricted funds may be used only in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund that owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets. All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current funds. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues when expended or when all eligibility requirements have been met and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Current Funds

Unrestricted current funds consist of those funds over which the college retains full control for use in achieving its authorized institutional purposes. Auxiliary enterprises activities are included in unrestricted current funds and include food services and the bookstore. Restricted current funds are externally restricted and may be used only in accordance with the purposes established by their source.

Loan Funds

Loan funds consist of resources made available for student loans.

Plant Funds

The plant funds group consists of (1) funds set aside for the acquisition of physical properties for institutional purposes; (2) funds set aside for the renewal and

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replacement of institutional properties; (3) funds set aside for debt service charges and for the retirement of the indebtedness on institutional properties; and (4) funds expended for, and thus invested in, institutional properties.

Agency Funds

In handling these funds, the college acts solely as an agent; consequently, transactions of these funds do not affect the college's operating statements.

**LGIP Deposit – Capital Projects**

Payments related to the college's capital projects are made by the State of Tennessee's Department of Finance and Administration. The college's estimated local share of the cost of each project is held in a separate Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) account. As expenditures are incurred, funds are withdrawn from the LGIP account by the Tennessee Board of Regents and transferred to the Department of Finance and Administration. The funds in the account are not available to the college for any other purpose until the project is completed and any remaining funds are released by the Tennessee Board of Regents.

**Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost or market on a first-in, first-out basis.

**Compensated Absences**

The college's employees accrue annual leave at varying rates, depending on length of service or classification. Some employees also earn compensatory time. The amount of these liabilities and their related benefits are recorded in the current funds. Since the liability is expected to be funded primarily from future unrestricted and restricted revenue sources, a related allocation has been made to the current fund balances so that these fund balances reflect current available funds.

**Allocation for Working Capital**

The unrestricted fund balance is allocated for the amount of working capital. "Working capital" is defined as the total of all petty cash, accounts receivable, inventories, and prepaid expenses in the unrestricted fund at the balance sheet date, except for student receivables credited to deferred revenue, accrued interest, and amounts due on federal letters of credit, less the accrued benefits on accrued faculty salaries.

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**Plant Assets**

The physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of purchase or at fair value at date of donation. Library books are valued at \$48 per volume, and other library holdings are valued at various standardized values, which approximate current costs. Depreciation on the physical plant and equipment is not recorded.

In the case of service departments, the college charges renewal and replacement of plant assets to current expenditures; these charges are also reported as additions to funds for renewals and replacements.

**Interest Costs**

The college has adopted a policy of capitalizing all construction-related interest costs for capital projects funded by Tennessee State School Bond Authority indebtedness. All other interest costs are expensed.

**Pellissippi State Technical Community College Foundation**

The college is the sole beneficiary of the Pellissippi State Technical Community College Foundation. This private, nonprofit foundation is controlled by a board independent of the college. The financial records, investments, and other financial transactions are handled by the college, and the assets and liabilities of the foundation are included in the agency funds on the college's balance sheet.

**NOTE 2. CASH**

This classification includes demand deposits and petty cash on hand. At June 30, 2001, cash consisted of \$835,465.06 in bank accounts, \$4,125.00 of petty cash on hand, and \$2,980,618.26 in the State of Tennessee Local Government Investment Pool administered by the State Treasurer. At June 30, 2000, cash consisted of \$1,128,192.31 in bank accounts, \$3,000.00 of petty cash on hand, and \$5,798,171.72 in the State of Tennessee Local Government Investment Pool.

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**NOTE 3. DEPOSITS**

The college's deposits are in a financial institution which participates in the bank collateral pool administered by the State Treasurer. The securities pledged to protect these accounts are pledged in the aggregate rather than against each individual account. The members of the pool may be required by agreement to pay an assessment to cover any deficiency. Under this additional assessment agreement, public fund accounts covered by the pool are considered to be insured for purposes of credit risk disclosure.

The college also has deposits in the Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) administered by the State Treasurer. The LGIP is part of the Pooled Investment Fund. The fund's investment policy and custodial credit risk are presented in the *Tennessee Comprehensive Annual Financial Report*.

**NOTE 4. INVESTMENTS**

The college is authorized by statute to invest funds in accordance with Tennessee Board of Regents policies. Under the current policy, funds other than endowments may be invested only in obligations of the United States or its agencies backed by the full faith and credit of the United States; repurchase agreements for United States securities; certificates of deposit in banks and savings and loan associations; bankers' acceptances; commercial paper; money market mutual funds; and the State of Tennessee Local Government Investment Pool. The policy requires that investments of endowments in equity securities be limited to funds from private gifts or other sources external to the college and that endowment investments be prudently diversified. The Pellissippi State Technical Community College Foundation is authorized to invest funds in accordance with its board of directors' policies. All investments permitted to be reported at fair value under GASB Statement 31 are reported at fair value, including those with a maturity date of one year or less at the time of purchase.

The college's investments at June 30, 2001, and June 30, 2000, consisted solely of funds in the State of Tennessee Local Government Investment Pool which have been reported as cash.

**NOTE 5. PLEDGES**

At June 30, 2001, promises of private donations of \$598,661.80 to the Pellissippi State Technical Community College Foundation have been reported as accounts receivable in the agency fund, net of an estimated uncollectible allowance of \$18,515.31.

**NOTE 6. PLANT FUND ENCUMBRANCES**

Plant fund encumbrances outstanding at June 30, 2000, amounted to \$40,924.54 for unexpended plant and \$16,207.44 for renewals and replacements.

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**NOTE 7. NOTES PAYABLE**

The Pellissippi State Technical Community College Foundation purchased an option to buy the real property of Knoxville Catholic High School located at 1610 East Magnolia Avenue in Knoxville for \$2,150,000. The option is reported as an asset in agency funds at June 30, 2000. The foundation borrowed funds in order to purchase the option. The related note had an annual interest rate of 7.75%, a face amount of \$1,632,000, and due dates of July 8, 1999, and January 9, 2000, for equal payments of \$816,000. With the permission of the holder of the note, the second payment of \$816,000 was actually remitted on July 11, 2000. The balance owed by the foundation at June 30, 2000, as reported in agency funds, was \$816,000.

**NOTE 8. PENSION PLANS**

**A. Defined Benefit Plan**

**Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System**

Plan Description - The college contributes to the State Employees, Teachers, and Higher Education Employees Pension Plan (SETHEEPP), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer, defined benefit pension plan administered by the Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System (TCRS). TCRS provides retirement, death, and disability benefits as well as annual cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and their beneficiaries. Title 8, Chapters 34-37, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, establishes benefit provisions. State statutes are amended by the Tennessee General Assembly.

The TCRS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for SETHEEPP. That report may be obtained by writing to the Tennessee Department of the Treasury, Consolidated Retirement System, 10th Floor Andrew Jackson Building, Nashville, Tennessee 37243-0230, or by calling (615) 741-8202.

Funding Policy - Plan members are noncontributory. The college is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The current rate is 6.19% of annual covered payroll. Contribution requirements for the college are established and may be amended by the TCRS Board of Trustees. The college's contributions to TCRS for the years ended June 30, 2001, 2000, and 1999, were \$423,209.10,

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\$318,005.82, and \$313,771.04. Contributions met the requirements for each year.

**B. Defined Contribution Plans**

**Optional Retirement Plans (ORP)**

Plan Description - The college contributes to three defined contribution plans: Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association—College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA-CREF), Aetna Life Insurance and Annuity Company, and Variable Annuity Life Insurance Company (VALIC). These plans are administered by the Tennessee Department of the Treasury. Each plan provides retirement benefits to faculty and staff who are exempt from the overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act and who waive membership in the TCRS. Benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan plus investment earnings. Plan provisions are established by state statute in Title 8, Chapter 35, Part 4, *Tennessee Code Annotated*. State statutes are amended by the Tennessee General Assembly.

Funding Policy - Plan members are noncontributory. The college contributes an amount equal to 10% of the employee's base salary up to the social security wage base and 11% above the social security wage base. Contribution requirements are established and amended by state statute. The contribution made by the college to the plans was \$954,709.32 for the year ended June 30, 2001, and \$776,897.57 for the year ended June 30, 2000. Contributions met the requirements for each year.

**NOTE 9. OTHER POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

The State of Tennessee administers a group health insurance program which provides post-employment health insurance benefits to eligible college retirees. This benefit is provided and administered by the State of Tennessee. The college assumes no liability for retiree health care programs. 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**NOTE 10. CUMULATIVE EFFECT OF A CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLE**

During the year ended June 30, 2000, the threshold for capitalizing equipment increased from \$1,000 to \$5,000. As a result of the change, equipment decreased by \$7,535,937.92.

**NOTE 11. INSURANCE-RELATED ACTIVITIES**

The state purchases commercial insurance for real property losses above \$5 million per year and surety bond coverage on the state's officials and employees. During the year ended June 30, 1999, the state incurred losses in Clarksville and Jackson due to damage from tornadoes. The final settlement of \$8.96 million for the tornado damage in Clarksville was made during the year ended June 30, 2001. In the years ended June 30, 2000, and June 30, 1998, the state did not have any claims filed with the commercial insurer. A designation for casualty losses in the amount of \$8.731 million at June 30, 2001, and \$7.256 million at June 30, 2000, was established in the state's general fund to provide for any property losses not covered by the commercial insurance.

At June 30, 2001, the scheduled coverage for the college was \$47,922,100 for buildings and \$13,890,500 for contents. At June 30, 2000, the scheduled coverage was \$47,579,900 for buildings and \$15,513,600 for contents.

The state has set aside assets for claim settlement in an internal service fund, the Claims Award Fund. This fund services all claims for risk of loss to which the state is exposed, including general liability, automobile liability, professional malpractice, and workers' compensation. The college participates in the Claims Award Fund. The fund allocates the cost of providing claims servicing and claims payment by charging a premium to the college based on a percentage of the college's expected loss costs, which include both experience and exposures. This charge considers recent trends in actual claims experience of the state as a whole. An actuarial valuation is performed as of fiscal year-end to determine the fund liability and premium allocation. Since the college participates in the Claims Award Fund, it is subject to the liability limitations under the provisions of the Tennessee Claims Commission Act, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, Section 9-8-101 et seq. Liability for negligence of the college for bodily injury and property damage is limited to \$300,000 per person and \$1,000,000 per occurrence. The limits of liability under workers' compensation are set forth in

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*Tennessee Code Annotated*, Section 50-6-101 et seq. Claims are paid through the state's Claims Award Fund.

The state has also set aside assets in the Employee Group Insurance Fund, an internal service fund, to provide a program of health insurance coverage for the employees of the state with the risk retained by the state. The college participates in the Employee Group Insurance Fund. The fund allocates the cost of providing claims servicing and claims payment by charging a premium to the college based on estimates of the ultimate cost of claims that have been reported but not settled and of claims that have been incurred but not reported. Employees and providers have 13 months to file medical claims.

**NOTE 12. FEDERAL STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE**

The restricted expenditure function scholarships and fellowships includes \$4,145,648.36 of federal financial assistance to students for the year ended June 30, 2001, and \$3,518,402.14 for the year ended June 30, 2000. These programs include, but are not limited to, Federal Pell Grants and Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants.

**NOTE 13. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES**

Sick Leave - The college records the cost of sick leave when paid. Generally, since sick leave (earned one day per month with unlimited accumulation) is paid only when an employee dies or is absent because of illness, injury, or related family death, there is no liability for sick leave at June 30. The dollar amount of unused sick leave was \$4,847,730.38 at June 30, 2001, and \$4,016,152.66 at June 30, 2000.

Construction in Progress - At June 30, 2001, outstanding commitments under construction contracts totaled \$346,979.70 for the Goins Building Renovation project, the ADA Improvements project, and the Division Street Campus Heating and Cooling project, of which \$346,979.70 will be funded by future state capital outlay appropriations.

The required basic financial statements described above are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Fund financial statements are not required for BTA reporting.

Statement 34 will also require the college to retroactively and prospectively report all capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, including infrastructure assets (long-lived capital assets such as roads and bridges) in the statement of net assets and report depreciation expense in the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets. Retroactive reporting of capital assets will require a prior period adjustment to net assets. Management has not yet determined the effect of the implementation of this statement on the college's financial statements.
